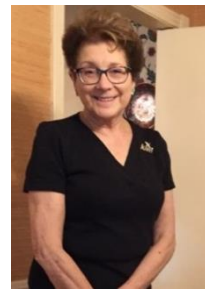
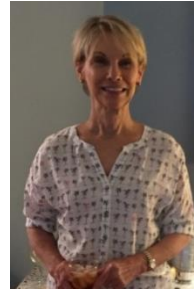

VIVIAN SHATTUCK JORGENSEN National President 1964-1966 1914-2021

Below are words from Vivian just a few short years ago when she celebrated her 102nd birthday. We are saddened to announce that Vivian flew west recently at the age of 107! Vivian was, and will continue to be, an institution and inspiration in The Kiwi Club.

"I graduated from stewardess school in 1937 and just celebrated my 102nd birthday.

"Years ago, I was honored to serve as First Vice President on The Kiwi Club's National Board. That was in 1960. After my two-year stint in that position ended, I took a break, but was later elected to serve as your seventh National President in 1964. Of course, as many of you know, that meant serving another two terms, first as a Past President/Parliamentarian, then as your Advisor.

"Those eight years added much to my life. Many, many friends across the nation have kept in touch with me over the years. And many of you helped me celebrate my 102nd birthday for which I am grateful.

"It was and continues to be a pleasure to belong to The Kiwi Club!"

"I am Vivian Shattuck Jorgensen, National President, 1964-1966."

After she served as president in 1964, she continued being involved with the club. Viv is the reason we have the Kiwi Archives.

"...Vivian Shattuck Jorgensen, The Kiwi Club Archivist, took the initiative to begin a collection of memorabilia and artifacts that are now known as The Kiwi Club Archives. I do not believe anyone has had a more profound impact on The Kiwi Club than Viv," wrote Gerrie Skaggs McAlhany.

For years, Viv saved many, many, many items in her basement. Gerrie Skaggs McAlhany stepped in and made trips to New York to do the tedious job of going through the basement items, saving, discarding, and organizing the many documents into a history of The Kiwi Club. Viv's accumulation made possible our Archives for posterity.

Viv will live on in our memories and in our history. At Gerrie's request, the title "Archivist" was retired to honor Viv.

SPOTLIGHT 1964 – Part One

After wearing uniforms with overseas hats for the past 27 years, it was time for a change. In 1964, American Airlines' stewardesses received a new uniform that introduced a new style of hat – the "Mushroom Hat."

According to an article in the *Dallas Morning News*, Neiman-Marcus thought this hat was a "beauty." [See article below] And it was...it just wasn't easy to wear. Unlike previous stewardess hats, this one didn't seem to sit well on top of one's head. It is also the hat remembered for ruining lots of new hairdos. Many stewardesses of that era told me they frequently used curlers under it to keep from getting hat hair! However, it really didn't matter how this hat was worn as long as the AA eagle emblem pin was worn over the right-facing eyebrow.

The new uniform featured an updated jacket design with three matching fabric-covered buttons. The jacket continued to be worn with three-quarter-length sleeves, along with a pencil skirt that no longer included a kick pleat in the back of the skirt. The uniform was completed with a new white one-notch-collar blouse.

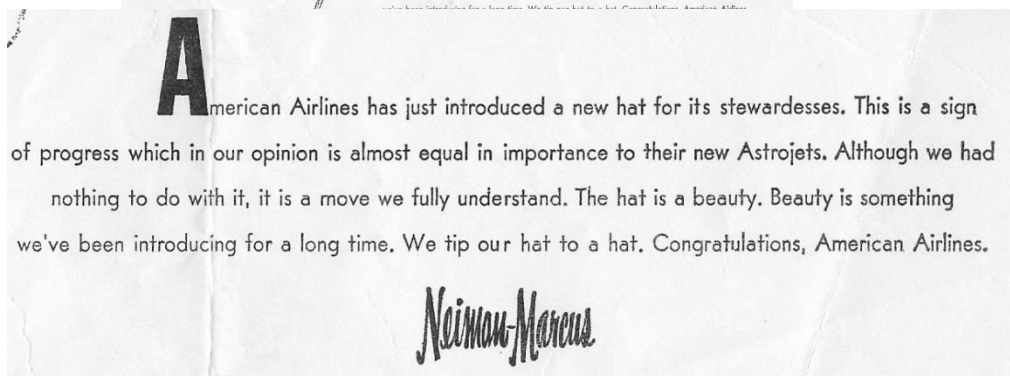
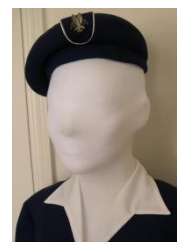

Similar to Miss Congeniality in a beauty pageant, this award was given to the new-hire stewardess thought to be the most likely to succeed. And yes, there is one like it in The Kiwi Club's Archival Uniform Collection.

AA Stewardess Catherine Penrod is seen in this photo on the right wearing the new uniform and holding the Junior Birdman Award she had just received. Her class graduation was unique as there was a tie when the ballots were counted to select the recipient of this award. As a result, both stewardesses were given the award and each received her own Bozo as a keepsake. The doll Catherine is

holding is the one shown in the photo.

Find out by contacting a current member of the Board to explore the possibility of your running for office. The board is the springboard to keeping our organization alive, up and running. It is also the springboard to making new friends and having fun while doing an important job.

According to our National Bylaws, the **National President** position has to be filled by someone who has previously served on the Board. And time isn't a factor – if you served five, ten, twenty, or however many terms ago, you are eligible to run for president. The president presides at all board meetings, oversees the work of the board including the budget, sets board meeting agendas, is the person who meets the public and is the face of The Kiwi Club.

The **National Vice President** is the liaison between members at large and the Board. She/he makes sure that members at large know they are an important part of this organization. Additionally, the VP constantly seeks new members, works to get new chapters going, and is involved in public relations for the Club.

The **2nd Vice President** is our glue. She/he handles all the information of our membership, both current and past. She keeps the Kiwi database current, liaises with the National Treasurer for information, and provides lists and labels used in the Club's operations, including our website and the official newsletter, the *Kiwi Kaleidoscope*.

The **National Secretary** records and prepares the minutes of all Board meetings, both during the term and at convention, and distributes them to the Board. She/he sends cards as needed and welcoming letters to new members. She/he is in charge of overseeing the meeting room for the Delegates Meeting at convention. She/he performs other duties as needed and requested by the National President.

The **National Treasurer** handles our money! She/he receives all dues, acknowledges their receipt, and is in constant contact with the 2nd VP, making sure the database is up to date. She/he handles the bank accounts, making payments as needed, and prepares a budget for the term. She/he keeps all board members apprised of the treasury.

A Brief History of The Kiwi Club Trophies and Awards

In 1961 an Awards Committee was appointed by National President Boots Johnson Hogate. This committee recommended two special awards be presented during the 1962 convention, the tenth anniversary of The Kiwi Club.

The first award presented was a loving cup, given to the Tulsa Chapter for raising \$1,000 to help with hospital expenses of a member, plus a certificate for the chapter titled, “To a Small Chapter with a Big Heart.”

The second award(s) were silver charms and certificates to eight women on the original organizing committee who met in New York in the 40’s to spearhead the national organization: Ann Gale Darcy, Mozelle Lowry Bishop, Evelyn Leedy McCormick, Eileen McDermott Ross, Jean McKiel Wells, Skip Hogan Grewe, Bertie Cole Clark, and Pat Green Benson.

In 1963, a totara wood kiwi bird was presented to The Kiwi Club by Kenneth McLauchlan of Auckland, New Zealand. It was suggested that this trophy be presented to a chapter which has been outstanding in some capacity.

In 1964, C.R. Smith, President, American Airlines, asked Kiwi Counselor Kay Hanson to purchase three silver trophies as a gift to The Kiwi Club. It was recommended that the three trophies be awarded at the discretion of the National Board and Advisors. It was not necessarily to be given at each convention. The awards:

The Presidents Cup – Principal award given by the National President at her/his discretion.

Memorial Award Tray – Named after the first stewardess killed in the line of duty. This was named the “Perla Gasparini Award.”*

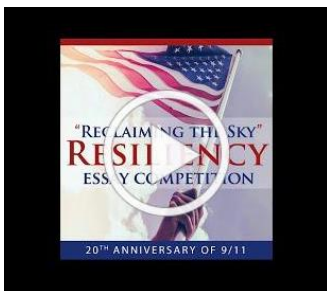
Kay Hansen Cup – Award to honor the inspiration Kay gave to The Kiwi Club and its survival.

*After this award was named to honor Perla Gasparini who died in 1936 in the line of duty, it was found that Ada Huckleby actually was the first to be killed in the line of duty in 1934. The award was renamed The Memorial Award.

The Kiwi Award, initiated in 1974, is granted to honor and recognize an individual Kiwi or organization by a chapter. The award is for continuous – not less than five years – dedication, assistance, support, or promotion of a local Kiwi chapter or The Kiwi Club. More than one chapter member, or a member at large, may be submitted for consideration, as well as any organization fitting the requirements.

In 1978, the Kiwi Award of Excellence was presented for the first time. It was given to the Chicago Chapter for their continuing support of Park Lawn Hospital. This award is given to recognize a chapter for its continual dedication and support of its local community as well as The Kiwi Club. This award is not given every term.
